COMPETENCY MODEL FOR UNDERGROUND DISTRIBUTION CONSTRUCTION SUPERVISOR (3814) - 2023

The following competencies have been identified as those that best separate superior from satisfactory job performance in the class of **UNDERGROUND DISTRIBUTION CONSTRUCTION SUPERVISOR.** (Numbers refers to the order of the competencies in the Competency Bank.)

- 4. Analytical Ability
- 6. Attention to Detail
- 7. Self-Management
- 8. Safety Focus
- 20. Job Knowledge
- 28. Supervision
- 42. Resolves Conflict
- 53. Leadership

On the following pages are descriptions of each competency, including a definition, the level of the competency required for the class (italicized, bolded, and underlined), examples of behavioral indicators, and satisfactory and superior performance levels.

4. ANALYTICAL ABILITY – Identifies, obtains, and evaluates relevant information to establish relationships or patterns, cite causes, and reach logical conclusions.

Level of Competency Required by Job:

Level 1: Recognize similarities/differences in current situation to those previously encountered and is guided accordingly. Apply existing policies correctly. Ask pertinent questions or otherwise seek additional information to formulate appropriate response.

Level 2: <u>Consider multiple, varied factors when evaluating a situation or issue. Seek additional information to provide further insight.</u>

Reach conclusions that logically follow from the information obtained.

Level 3: Consider a multitude of diverse factors, their interrelationships, the perspectives of others, alternative courses of action and their likely ramifications when evaluating information to reach a conclusion.

Examples of Behavioral Indicators:

- Obtains the necessary amount of relevant information.
- Recognizes the impact of each type of information on conclusions.
- Evaluates the quality/source of information when considering it.
- States the shortcomings of the information and, therefore, the analysis.

Performance Levels:

<u>Satisfactory</u> <u>Superior</u>

Recognizes available relevant information, seeks additional information to consider, and reaches conclusion. Provides sound. а convincing iustification for conclusions, citing relevant data and facts.

Uses a great deal of existing and obtained information and data to develop and evaluate alternatives and arrive at a final conclusion. Provides compelling arguments in support of conclusions

6. ATTENTION TO DETAIL – Extremely careful in addressing all aspects of each work assignment in order to produce "completed staff work" and/or avoid any negative outcomes.

Level of Competency Required by Job:

Level 1: Ensure all aspects of work assignment are completed as directed.

Level 2: Verify that each aspect of work assignment is properly completed;

make logical inference regarding additional activities that may need

to be performed to produce "completed staff work."

Level 3: Include evaluation of final work/work product in its

accomplishment; make adjustments as possible to improve.

Examples of Behavioral Indicators:

- Carefully checks all aspects of work for completion and accuracy before submitting.
- Identifies errors (for example, typo's, computations, measurements, application of laws/rules/policies) and corrects them prior to submitting.
- Cross-checks work against available resources.
- Sets up a means of checks and balances to ensure work accuracy.
- Considers changes in final work product to ensure usability by recipient.
- Completes all revisions upon request.

Performance Levels:

<u>Satisfactory</u> <u>Superior</u>

Ensures that each task accomplished represents "completed staff work." No remaining details/ inconsistencies for others to address.

All aspects of each task completed are verified to be correct. Identifies any foreseeable consequences of work that may need to be addressed and does so.

7. SELF MANAGEMENT – Organizes and plans for task accomplishment; manages time and works diligently to complete assigned work/fulfill responsibilities.

Level of Competency Required by Job:

Level 1: Order tasks for efficient performance; maintain awareness of time allotted and deadlines in order to ensure they are met.

Level 2: Plan and perform work in a way that maximizes efficient performance; establish and adjust priorities to ensure timely completion of most critical assignments.

Level 3: <u>Allot time to responsibilities proportional to their prominence, priority, and impact.</u>

Examples of Behavioral Indicators:

- Performs only work activities during work hours.
- Alters means of performing work when original approach proves to waste time.
- Keeps a "to do" list (with indication of priority and deadlines, if necessary).
- Requests assistance as necessary when it becomes clear that work will not be completed on time.
- Demonstrates a record of progress with respect to all assignments/ responsibilities.
- Uses optimal means of communication for efficiency and effectiveness.

Performance Levels:

<u>Satisfactory</u>

Conducts self while at work in a manner that ensures work will be completed as scheduled, or provides explanation or secures assistance or adjustment of schedule if it will not be.

Superior

Seeks efficiencies in doing work to maximize productivity. Plans work carefully and follows the plan or makes adjustments if it is disrupted. Maintains personal responsibility for all work accomplishment.

8. SAFETY FOCUS – Performs work in a way that minimizes risk of injury to self or others.

Level of Competency Required by Job:

Level 1: Maintain awareness of unsafe conditions and actions to avoid injury.

Level 2: Follow safety rules/procedures; avoid known hazards in the work

environment.

Level 3: <u>Carefully follow safety rules and procedures and consistently</u>

use all necessary safety equipment.

Examples of Behavioral Indicators:

Wears seat belt.

- Ensures safe physical work environment by taking actions such as eliminating unstable stacks of materials, closing drawers so filing cabinets will not tip over, and keeping pathways clear of tripping hazards.
- Reviews safety procedures before beginning each job with known hazards.
- Follows safety procedures while performing work even when it takes more time.
- Uses safety equipment such as goggles, gloves, and earplugs as required or warranted.
- Frequently checks safety equipment for proper condition and operation.

Performance Levels:

<u>Satisfactory</u> <u>Superior</u>

Maintains awareness of personal safety to avoid injury or property damage during all work activities.

"Safety first." Places avoidance of injury or property damage above all other job requirements. Mentions the need to follow safe work practices to co-workers. Actively seeks ways to avoid injury.

20. JOB KNOWLEDGE – Knows information required to perform a specific job. Includes both widely available courses of study (for example, chemistry, human resources management, graphic arts) and City-specific information (parking regulation and ticketing practices; purchasing procedures; provisions of the City Charter).

<u>Level of Competency Required by Job</u>:

Level 1: Knowledge is concrete, factual, and/or procedural and may be defined by the organization. Situations in which it is applied are quite consistent.

Level 2: Knowledge is substantive and may be defined by an external trade, field, or profession. Situations in which it is applied vary and, as such, require breadth and depth of understanding.

Level 3: Knowledge is abstract, conceptual, and/or complex and may be supported by a well-defined academic discipline or authoritative sources (e.g., laws, ordinances, government guidelines/regulations/ codes). Situations in which it is applied may vary greatly or be novel.

Examples of Behavioral Indicators:

- Performs work correctly/avoids technical (job content related) errors.
- Answers technical questions about work accurately.
- Asks few technical questions about the performance of routine work activities.
- Offers advice ("coaching") to new employees regarding their work.
- Develops training programs for other employees.
- Sought out as a source of information by others.

Performance Levels:

<u>Satisfactory</u> <u>Superior</u>

Sufficient job knowledge to perform work correctly independently. Answers technical questions about work correctly.

Expertise in technical job information sufficient to serve as a resource to others. May develop training manuals/ programs and/or give internal and/or external presentations related to work.

Job Knowledge Areas

- 1. Knowledge of the use of compressors, pavement breakers, cranes, cement mixers, tractors, pneumatic tools, power hoists, skip loaders, earth-moving equipment, and other underground construction equipment sufficient to use and supervise the use of equipment on the job site.
- Knowledge of City of Los Angeles and Department of Water and Power Equal Employment Opportunity (EEO) programs sufficient to develop and support employees.
- Knowledge of all types of underground construction, including non-electrical phases of underground construction sufficient to read and interpret plans and diagrams.
- Knowledge of standardized types of plans for the construction of maintenance holes, underground vaults, and conduit lines sufficient to interpret plans and drawings.
- 5. Knowledge of the hazards of working in and around electric or energized maintenance holes, vaults, excavations, energized electrical equipment, and other substructures containing hazardous materials; and the proper placement of approved warning devices sufficient to ensure safe work conditions on the job site.
- 6. Knowledge of the methods, uses and limitations of materials and tools used in performing rough carpentry; form building and installation; and excavation, shoring, and cement work sufficient to complete construction, maintenance, or repair of underground ducts, conduit lines, maintenance holes, and vaults.
- 7. Knowledge of safety regulations, practices, and non-electrical phases related to underground construction including safety regulations of the Department of Water and Power, the Distribution Construction and Maintenance Section; the City Department of Transportation; and Cal/OSHA requirements sufficient to ensure a safe work environment.
- 8. Knowledge of electrical hazards related to underground construction sufficient to ensure a safe work environment.
- 9. Knowledge of pertinent City and Personnel Department rules, policies, and procedures including Memoranda of Understanding (MOU) sufficient to manage subordinate personnel.
- 10. Knowledge of survey marking as symbols as related to locating underground facilities (Underground Service Alert (USA)) sufficient to prevent damaging natural gas lines, water mains, storm drains, and other utility systems.
- 11. Knowledge of procedures for exposing energized lines and cables encased in concrete sufficient to complete work assignments and ensure crew safety.

- 12. Knowledge of general underground construction standards, methods, and practices sufficient to complete and manage work assignments.
- 13. Knowledge of simple line diagrams sufficient to layout and construct from a blueprint or construction drawing of an underground power system.
- 14. Knowledge of WATCH Manual sufficient to safely delineate worksite in compliance with City and State rules and regulations.

28. SUPERVISION -

Ability to assume direct responsibility for all aspects of the performance of a work group, which requires knowledge and/or ability in the areas of:

- Planning and goal setting
- Creating a safe and positive work environment
- Establishing standards and training employees
- Motivating employees and teambuilding
- Performance Management (assigning, monitoring, facilitating, reviewing and evaluating work, and providing feedback)
- Supporting and developing employees through delegation and participation
- Taking disciplinary action including progressive discipline
- Provisions of employees' MOU's and handling grievances
- Legal requirements including EEO, ADA, FLSA, FMLA, and Workers' Compensation provisions
- Civil Service Commission Rules and Policies related to the management of employees
- Administrative Code provisions related to the management of employees
- Budget processes sufficient to request and justify expenditures in a correct and timely manner

Level of Competency Required by Job:

- Level 1: Supervises small workgroup of employees performing the same or highly related work.
- Level 2: Supervises a larger workgroup of employees performing various types of work.
- Level 3: <u>Supervises employees including provision of coaching and advice to subordinate supervisors.</u>

Examples of Behavioral Indicators:

- Plans, assigns, and monitors work progress.
- Trains employees to do work.
- Evaluates work and gives positive and negative feedback.
- Displays knowledge of legal requirements including applicable Federal and State laws, Administrative Code provisions, Civil Service Commission Rules and Policies, and MOU provisions.

Performance Levels:

<u>Satisfactory</u>

Proficiency in supervision sufficient to supervise a workgroup in terms of task orientation, interpersonal concerns, and personnel administration.

Superior

Proficiency in supervision sufficient to serve as a resource to others and/or represent department position in a public forum.

42. RESOLVES CONFLICT – Acknowledges and takes action to eliminate ineffective/disruptive interpersonal relationships.

Level of Competency Required by Job:

Level 1: Recognize that conflict is inappropriate in the workplace; ensure no

personal involvement in conflict or promptly seek elimination if such involvement occurs. May try to avert conflict among co- workers or

to eliminate it if it occurs.

Level 2: <u>Monitor staff for possible signs of arising conflict and, when</u>

noted, immediately intervene to reconcile. Recognize when the differing perspectives of different organizational units become disruptive and address the issues with involved parties or

management, as appropriate.

Level 3: Recognize that the purposes/objectives of certain entities are

inherently at odds and approach interactions with them with sensitivity and facilitates others' doing so as well. Recognize the debilitating nature of emergent conflict among organizational

segments and, when noted, immediately intervene to reconcile.

Examples of Behavioral Indicators:

- Recognizes when a conflict is emerging or has emerged.
- Mentions the need to resolve conflict to other involved party(ies).
- Brings together parties in conflict and encourages them to resolve/ facilitates resolution.
- Articulates the common objectives of conflicting entities.
- Enlists the participation of conflict resolution specialists when warranted.

Performance Levels:

<u>Satisfactory</u> <u>Superior</u>

Diffuses conflict at work. Uses other means of addressing interpersonal friction, disagreement, or competing goals. Notes and seeks resolve of conflict among others.

Recognizes interpersonal, intraorganizational, and internal-external organizational interactions with conflict potential, and seeks to avoid. When signs of merging conflict noted, immediately takes steps to eliminate.

53. LEADERSHIP – Influences others toward goal accomplishment.

Level of Competency Required by Job:

Level 1: Assume responsibility for operations or a situation when necessary. Direct the actions of others or otherwise ensure required actions are taken. Remain responsible until relieved or situation is resolved.

Level 2: <u>Motivate others to continual activity focused on goal accomplishment. Provide clear objectives and articulate individual activities necessary to achieve them; ensure resources necessary to do so are available. Monitor work progress and provide feedback; assess results.</u>

Level 3: Articulate a vision, convey it to others, and assign responsibilities (or assure they are assigned) for achieving it. Monitor progress, make adjustments as necessary, and evaluate results.

Examples of Behavioral Indicators:

- Evaluates circumstances, determining what needs to be done, and ensuring individual responsibility for performing specific actions is assigned.
- Follows-up to ensure that specific actions have been taken and overall objective has been accomplished.
- Clearly communicates objectives and responsibility/individual actions necessary to achieve them.
- Monitors work in progress, provides feedback to those involved, and makes adjustments to work plans/processes to ensure goal attainment.
- Evaluates completed work for quality, thoroughness, and effectiveness to determine whether re-work or additional work is required to meet intended objectives and to provide learning for future assignments

Performance Levels:

<u>Satisfactory</u>

Assumes responsibility for work of others when required or necessary. Ensures actions taken to achieve objectives, and evaluates results to determine any follow-up needed.

Superior

Articulates vision/states clear objectives and assigns responsibility/motivates others toward achievement. Monitors progress; gives feedback; evaluates results; ensures follow-up.
